
THE CREATION OF YOUR RUBY

Nature's selections, even for precious and beautiful stones, are brutal, but your ruby belongs to one of the hardest families of minerals the universe has ever produced. Its chemical composition and the way they are assembled are matched by only one other mineral family on earth. This allows your ruby to stand the test of time. It will remain dormant for a few more million years, first in the depths of the earth and then slowly transported to the surface by mountain formations or volcano, waiting to be found.

The word Ruby comes from the Latin "Rubeus" meaning "Red", The ancient Sanskrit called it "Ratnaraj" or "King of gemstone", Pliny the Elder in The Natural History mentioned two thousand years ago the hardness and resistance to fire of the ruby. Red being a passionate color, Ruby symbolizes love, fire, and life, it is without surprise that ruby has been cherished by early cultures as well as modern Royalty and upper class. Ancient Hindus believed that those who offered fine rubies to the god were granted rebirth as emperors, Burmese warriors possessed rubies to make them invincible in battle and medieval Europeans wore rubies to guarantee health, wealth, wisdom, and success in love. Ragiel writes about ruby in the 13th-century work, The Book of Wings: that the beautiful figure of a dragon. If this is found on a ruby [...], has the power to augment the goods of this world and makes the wearer joyous and healthy.



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
Red, Purplish Red & Pink Hues—340 to 15°

This legend goes back at least to the Middle Ages, the earliest mention known to us of Pigeon blood is the story of the famous royal ruby or Nga Mauk ruby described as being of the color of pigeon's blood.

Another legend mentions that Burmese warriors in medieval times put rubies in contact with their blood to gain invulnerability in battle. The ancient Greeks believed that rubies were a remnant of a god's blood.

Red has always been associated with blood, sacrifice, and courage. Modern studies in Europe and the United States show that red is the color most associated with heat, passion, sexuality, love, and joy. In China, India and many Asian countries, red is the color that symbolizes happiness and good fortune.

It is therefore not surprising that pigeon's blood, which most probably recalls the red color of a pigeon's fresh blood or the blood-red ring surrounding a pigeon's eyes, became the historical adjective describing the best red, first by the Burmese and then by the traders along the Silk Road. It may have been the best red they could find at the time, or it may be a poetic term reminiscent of a long-lost Burmese legend.
